Brown, Coach Gaddy, and Patrolman Wagner took part in the demonstration. Patrolman Wagner made the quickest stopping distance which was eighty-two feet at forty miles per hour. S. were greatly impressed by the demonstration of the need for safety on the highways of North Carolina.
