High Point, May 16—The Lexington High School golfers finished sixth in the race for the state high school golf crowd despite the fact that not one of the foursome finished in the top ten individual scores.

Fifteen-year-old Bobby Sisk captured individual honors as he carded a 76-72—148 in the 36-hole, par 70, Emerywood course near High Point. Last week the “little wonder” captured the Carolina Scholastic Tournament in Greenville, S. C.

Little Dunlop White, Lexington’s little man with a big stick, carded a 77-80—157 to lead the local aggregation. Gaither Walser had an 85-82—167, Joe Bafford an 85-82—167, and Bobby Shytle an 88-88—176.

Teh Central High School Wildcats captured team honors with a 608-stroke total, a 76 average per man.
