As we, the people in the United States look at the international problem, it becomes a national problem. This problem is the great war facing the world today.

With four continents opposed to the danger the way of life, the just as America ally ourselves with the democratic countries in the Americas in order that we be able to fight the Nazi in case of an attempted invasion of the hemisphere.

In considering our national war problem the National Defense proposition comes up for our consideration. We must train and equip our armed forces; this includes the Army, Navy and the Marines as well as the Air Corp.

Then comes the problem of what part shall the Negro play in our Defense of Democracy. We will consider the Negro in the army. Through the country, men are being trained by our War Department for military service for the country. We find a lot of our colored soldiers being sent to southern camps. Which brings more discrimination, segregation and race prejudice to our country.

In the navy Negroes are being used only as mess attendants. In the Air Corp we are being trained for service in a segregated unit.

The President in a recent address to the nation called for all-out aid to England and Russia. He also said that every American citizen must cooperate with all might and power in order to protect democracy. Pray tell me how can the thirty million Negroes in the United States give wholehearted support to the defense of democracy in Europe when in this country he is being discriminated against, segregated and oppressed in every branch of our armed forces.

Until this country extends to the Negro economic, political and social equality we will never be able to build an impregnable defense system nationally or internationally . . . 30 . . .
