His comments . . . "I want to congratulate all Brevard Plant employees for the excellent job done so far this year to improve quality and costs along with an increase in output.

"We have been very fortunate at the Brevard Plant not to have experienced the business slump that has been characteristic of business in general throughout the country. The primary reason for this is that we are making a high quality product that the customer wants.

"The improved efficiency in all areas of the plant has raised the question by some employees of whether there will be cutbacks in personnel and number of shifts worked. Based on our current forecasts, we anticipate no reduction in the number of shifts of operation in any area, although employee losses through attrition may not be replaced. Our volume may fluctuate from month to month, but overall we see a steady increase in demand for product from our plant—if we continue to make what the customer wants."
