

## HONOR AWARDS AT G. H. S. OCCASION OF KEEN SPECULATION

Recipients Will Be Revealed at Graduation Exercises Tonight.

### MANY PRIZES ARE GIVEN

P.-T. A. Cup for Best All-Round Student Is Perhaps the Most Coveted Award.

Speculation has been keen at Senior High this week regarding the identity of the recipients of the annual honor awards which will be presented to members of the Senior class at the graduating exercises tonight.

Perhaps the most coveted award is the cup to be given by the Parent-Teacher association. This trophy will be presented to the senior chosen in a secret election by members of the class as the best all-round student. The student selected for this honor must have the qualities of scholarship, leadership, citizenship, and school service. The silver cup bears the inscription on one side, "Best All-Round Student 1937, Greensboro High School, Presented by the P.-T. A." On the other side which also carries the winner's name, is engraved, "A Strong Arm, A Clear Brain, A Brave Heart."

The short story award will be presented by the O. Henry Study Club for the best short story written by a senior graduating in the spring. The award will consist of a complete set of the works of O. Henry.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars medal will be presented to the senior who writes the best paper on Americanism.

Awarded by the Guilford Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, the Lizzie Lindsay cup will be given to the graduating senior who writes the best English or history paper on some phase of the Confederacy.

The music prize will be presented by Mr. H. Grady Miller to the senior who has done the most outstanding music during the year.

The award presented by the Guilford Chapter of the Daughters of the Revolution to the senior who writes the best paper on Greensboro to the North Carolina highest scholastic average during his high school career. The Civitan Club will also give a cup to the senior who writes the best essay on citizenship.

In addition to these awards, the debating cup will be given to the senior member of the club, judged by the other members to have rendered the greatest service to the organization this year.

## PAGEANT TONIGHT WILL BE FEATURE OF COMMENCEMENT

"Beyond the Blue Horizon" Is Title of Production to Be Presented by Seniors.

### DIVIDED INTO 4 SCENES

Dramatization Portrays Progress of Past and Reveals Opportunities of Future.

The conquest of new frontiers will be featured tonight at the Senior High School commencement pageant, entitled "Beyond the Blue Horizon."

This dramatization, which will portray the progress of the past and reveal the opportunities of the future, is divided into four scenes. The first scene, "Haven From Danger," depicts the early pioneer's victory over physical frontiers, as he advances in search of safety, food, and shelter.

In scene two, "Peace of Conscience," religious barriers are overcome when the Pilgrims are shown achieving their ideals of religious freedom.

Immediately following this, the search for the more material frontiers of wealth and adventure are surmounted. This division, entitled the "Lure of Gold," sketches, in brief, the history of the '49 gold rush.

Finally, man's triumph over social frontiers is pictured. Attempts to reach objectives in science, medicine, transportation, and communication are shown in "Vistas to Span."

In the epilogue, Superintendent Ben L. Smith will point out to the seniors that, although the old frontiers have vanished, new ones are constantly being erected. Despite the fact that barriers are now no longer of a geographical or material nature, men and women with vision are still constantly in demand to continue advancement in subduing sociological barriers of progress.

The pageant committee of faculty and students have done a great amount of detailed work upon the project which promises to be a very unusual production. Donovant, Maurice Lee, Jr., and James Hines, Georges Wilkins, Alvin Anderson, and Linney Whitley who wrote the poetic portion of the drama. Senior teachers who supervised the group are Miss Walker, Miss Minis, Mrs. Blanche Smith, Miss Wall, Miss Strickland and Mr. Hooks.

At the conclusion of the pageant Mr. Routh will present the honor awards, and Mr. Smith and Mr. Kalsner, chairman of the board, will present the diplomas.
