

## Nation-Wide Tuberculosis Campaign Features "Lighthouses of Science"

Stressing knowledge of the disease rather than the sale of seals, the National Tuberculosis association has once more launched its annual campaign for the cure and prevention of one of the worst and most prevalent killers in the United States.

Protect Your Home from Tuberculosis

In the pamphlet issued by the association a parallel is drawn between the purpose of lighthouses and the purpose of the tuberculosis committee. The lighthouse guides vessels into port and warns them of rocks and other dangers, while the association strives to "use the best scientific knowledge of our time to guide people to greater health and happiness and to warn them of dangers."

### Ignorance Major Foe of Health

Ignorance and tuberculosis walk hand-in-hand and, according to the association, it is impossible to kill one without exterminating the other. Sunlight, air, sleep and the proper vitamins are essential to the maintenance of general health, and, therefore, are vital in the prevention of tuberculosis since the latter is attributable to the collapse of the former.

In describing the 1941 seal, the National association book says, "This year the Christmas seal brings us a picture of Christmas in a far-off place. It is a happy scene in spite of the dark and cold. Looking at the cheerfully lighted windows, we can imagine the Christmas warmth and joy inside the little house. . . . So this 1941 seal of the National Tuberculosis association gives a far-reaching significance to the message of 'Merry Christmas' which it carries."

The local committee has reminded every student interested in the welfare of others and the protection of himself to co-operate by participating in the fight against ignorance and by buying Christmas seals.

## George Thompson Gives Organ Concert at W. C.
