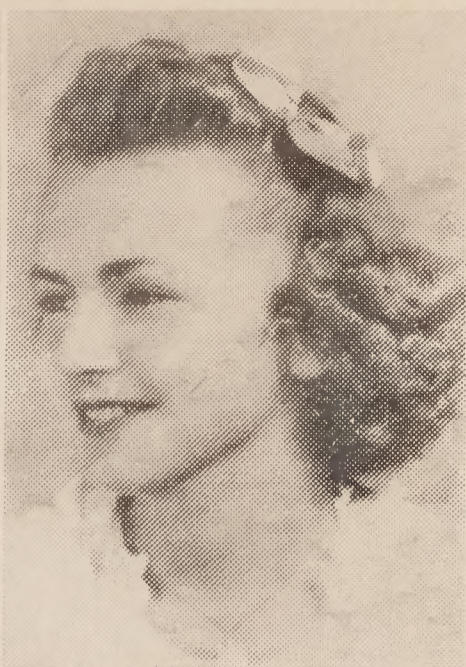
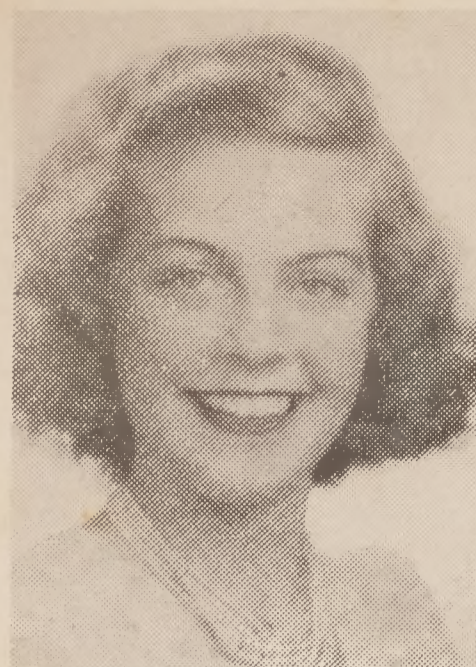

Around 900 To Attend P. T. A. Conference Opening Here April 8

Approximately 900 parent and teachers are expected to attend the 23rd annual convention of the North Carolina Congress of Parents and Teachers, convening in Greensboro, April 8-10, announced Mrs. J. S. Blair, state president, last week.

For the first few days forums and workshops designed to develop the theme of the convention, "The Community, The Workshop of Democracy," will constitute the program. The Greensboro council headed by Mrs. Claudius Dockery and Mr. C. W. Phillips, public relations director of Woman's college, will sponsor social functions for the delegates.

Convention Headquarters

Headquarters for the convention will be the King Cotton hotel. After the registration of delegates and visitors, at 10 a.m. Wednesday, April 8, the opening session will start at 2 p.m. with Mrs. Blair in the chair.

Dr. Harold Meyer, professor at the University of North Carolina and vice-president of the State Parent-Teacher Congress, will deliver the opening address. Mrs. W. A. Hastings, Madison, Wisconsin, first vice-president of the national convention will speak on "The P. T. A. Meets the Challenge of War."

Josephus Daniels of Raleigh, former ambassador to Mexico, will deliver an address on "The United States in the Present Hour."

Other speakers include, W. A. Dees, Goldsboro, president of the State School Board association, and Dr. E. R. Clincy of New York.

The numbers to be played, as announced by Mr. Hazelman, are "Pictures At An Exhibition" by Moussorgsky and "First Suite In E Flat for a Military Band" by Holst.

As for the contest itself, Mr. Hazelman declared that he and the directors of the event hope it will be as large and as good as those of previous years, but that attendance would probably be somewhat smaller because of transportation difficulties.

To Give Concerts

He also stated that in order to eliminate confusion he would like to make a personal appeal requesting only those who have business at the contest to attend.

In addition to contest work and in accordance with the request of the morale department of the O. C. D., the Greensboro band will present a series of open air concerts at the Lindley amphitheater. The first of the group will be given on Sunday, April 12.

These concerts will consist of stirring martial music, as well as numerous symphonic numbers, overtures and novelties. Although the senior high band will be featured, several junior high and elementary bands will participate.

Mr. Hazelman declared, "In this way we of the band at Senior high and the other bands taking part will be able to do our part in the 'National Victory' program."
