OXFORD MOWED DOWN TO TUNE OF 7 TOUCHDOWNS

Default By Oxford However Makes Score 1 to 0 in Greensboro's Favor.

How G. H. S' Rivals Came Out.
 Lexington, 32; Concord, 0.

Lexington, Oct. 16—Lexington high school sent the Concord high team down to a 32 to 0 defeat here yesterday afternoon, scoring two touchdowns in the first quarter and one in each of the three remaining quarters. The Lexington backs crashed through the Concord line and around ends almost at will. Hunt, local fullback, was the outstanding star of the game, never failing to gain and pick up 5, 10, 15, 25 and even 40 yards at time.

In the last few minutes of play the visitors uncorked a series of forward passes that carried them to the shadow of the local's goal, where they were stopped just as the game ended.

In four starts this season the local team, which is the first high school football team, ever organized here, has had its goal line crossed only once and has piled up 91 points on its opponents.

Winston-Salem, Oct. 16.—Neither was able to score in a football game here this afternoon between Charlotte high school and Winston-Salem. Each team put up a good defensive game. About 250 enthusiasts witnessed the contest.
