Under the conditions provided by the Greenshoro school board at its meeting Tuesday night, approximately 27 students have planned to become members of the present junior class. stay, a senior must present a signed statement that his parents wish him to remain an additional year and that they approve of the schedule planned by the student. This tentative proby the student. This tentative program must provide an adequate course study to merit the extra year of

According to Lloyd Griffin, secretary of the State School commission, North Carolina school units, as a whole, will not be able to add the 12th grade until 1942-43.

Griffin stated that, while the legislature authorized the extra year, the appropriation of about \$50,000 required for the establishment would not be available for general use until 1942. State Moved Thursday Seniors wishing to stay over were informed immediately about the acceptance of their applications and were moved from senior to junior home-rooms. "The purpose of this," declared Principal A. P. Routh, "is to move these new 'juniors' away from seniors to that seniors may make plans for graduation as a unit."
