Goal Reached In Bond Campaign

Room 317 Has 100% Participation; PT-19B Will Be Purchased

Although a complete record of purchases during the council's second war bond drive has not been compiled, the campaign was believed to have been successful beyond expectations. Sales had passed the \$14,000 mark yesterday and were brisk today. The bond window will be open Monday to take care of the bonds issued today.

A late tabulation had more than 300 students as buyers of bonds and stamps. Room 317 had 100% participation, while 300, 307 and 202 were close to that mark on Wednesday. The prize-winners were unavailable to the press at publication time.

With the money raised, Greensboro high will buy a Fairchild PT-19B, which may have within a plaque inscribed, "Purchased by the Students of Greensboro Senior High School."

World-Famous Evangelist Speaks, Advises 'Choose Your Goal Now'

Speaking on the topic "Faith," Dr. E. Stanley Jones held an audience of Senior high students spell-bound when he was speaker for the assembly program here Tuesday, May 2.

Doctor Jones, who has for 35 years lived in India, is an intimate friend of Mahatma Ghandi and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek. His talk dealt chiefly with the relationship between modern life and science and religion with its ancient and humble beginnings.

"Religion," Doctor Jones said, "has a beautifying and stabilizing effect on a person's life which is often completely lacking in moderns' belief, or disbelief of everything."

His description of the activities of the college student who confessed to his professor that he believed in nothing was well told, and it brought many people recollections of the times

Lions Club Sponsors Open House at Greensboro High

During the hours of 8 to 10 p. m., April 25, the Lions Club sponsored open house in the Vocational Building with over 1,000 people attending. As the guests entered the southern end of the building, they were given a mimeographed copy of the plans of the building and instructions to guide them throughout.

On the second floor were two typing and one shorthand class being taught as in the usual school day. The shorthand class was under the supervision of Miss Catherine Epley and the two typing classes under Mrs. Katherine McIntyre and Miss Undine Nye.

Following the commercial classes was the choir and band. The choir, under the direction of Miss Eula Tuttle, presented several numbers for an hour and the band under the direction of Mr. J. Harris Mitchell played.

Also on the second floor were drafting, D. E. and D. O. Classes in drafting are for 10th, 11th, and 12th grade boys and girls. After the first semester the student may elect to specialize in either machine, engineering or architectural drafting. One school year of 540 hours is the minimum requirement for recommendation to employment. Two units of credit are given. When requirements are completed the student will qualify for a civil service rating as a junior draftsman or may be employed as a draftsman in industry. Possibilities for employment are excellent for girls as well as boys.
