National Merit Scholarship Program and the Morehead Foundation have recently announced the names of several GHS seniors who have passed the first round of competition for the scholarships given by these two organizations.

The National Merit competition is on a nationwide basis, with 800 four-year scholarships being awarded annually throughout the nation. They are applicable to any accredited college in the United States. Morehead Scholarships apply to the University of North Carolina and are given throughout the state.

Denny Broadhurst, Peggy Earle, Buddy Rives, Betty Rose, Jim Sawers, Max Snodderly, and Angelyn Stokes are the seven seniors from GHS to enter the semi-finals in the National Merit competition. They were chosen on the basis of their scores on the Scholarship Qualifying Test taken last October. The group is a small part of the 7500 seniors throughout the nation who will continue in competition for these scholarships.

The Guilford County Morehead Scholarship Committee announced that its seven nominees for this \$5,000 award include two Seniors, Jey Deifell and Max Snodderly. These two boys will now go to the district committee for further competition.
