In another of the club's civic projects, the Key Club is helping boost the Greensboro Symphony by distributing posters and streamers in the shopping centers of the city.

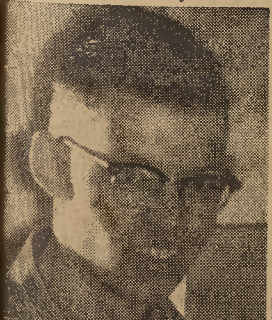
Two projects are currently in progress, George Bradham is securing a number of containers for the two smoking areas. These containers for cigarettes will be used to keep the area as clean as possible.

Waldo Hinshaw Winner Snodderly Wins Merit In State Physics Contest Scholarship Competition

Stanley Johnson, physics teacher at GHS, announced Thursday, April 24, that Waldo Hinshaw, senior, had won the State Physics contest over 1,000 other entries by answering the entire forty questions correctly.

Mr. Johnson stated that in his opinion this test was harder than the previous State Physics Tests which have been given, and that he expected no one to get all of

the questions answered correctly. Its questions covered mechanics and heat. Waldo will receive a scholarship amounting to \$600 at the University of North Carolina.

Larry Brown, last year's winner, also answered all of the questions correctly.

Max Snodderly, a senior who received honorable mention in the physics contest, was the entry from GHS in the State Math Contest given April 11. This contest holds a scholarship that would pay tuition for a year at one of the Carolina colleges. Brenda Alvis, and Eddie Stubbins, seniors, were the second and third choice from the 20 students who took the test, containing 10 algebra and 10 geometry questions.

Michael George and Bob Cunningham, juniors, and Ralph Daniels, senior, were the three entries selected in the State Chemistry Contest. This grants a \$600 scholarship to the University of North Carolina.

GHS senior Max Snodderly has been selected a winner of one of the 1,000 college scholarships offered through the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, according to information released yesterday, May 1.

Foundation Policy

By the policy of the foundation, the amount of the award is kept confidential, but the maximum is \$1500 annually for four years at any institution. Max has chosen the California Institute of Technology. Max's scholarship is being provided by the Mead Corporation.

The test that placed Max in the 1,000 winners was taken by 256,000 high school students. One out of every 1500 high school seniors in America is receiving a Merit Scholarship.

Seven In Finals

The students that scored high enough on the National Merit

Scholarship Qualifying Test to enter the semifinals were tested again, and if the second test confirmed their previous score they were admitted to the finals. More than 7400 students reached the finals including, besides, six other GHS seniors, Denny Broadhurst, Peggy Earle, Buddy Rives, Betty Rose, Jim Sawers, and Angelyn Stokes.

Finalists were studied in citizenship, scholastic record, extra-curricular activities and need, before the final selection of 1,000 winners was made.

Juniors Take Exam

About 75 GHS students embarked on the road of competition that Max has followed when they took the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, April 29.

For the first time juniors are now eligible to take the tests in the spring.

'58 Literary Magazine Hits GHS Newsstands
