a) The Iraq-Kuwait Situation:

b) The demise of the black male:

"First of all the black woman has the responsibility of standing behind the black man. Since the first slave ship came to America tne majority has undermined the intelligence and integrity of the black male. It's responsibility to make sure our children are truly educated about the black man. We need to teach them because have others intention of doing so."

Miss Jenkins elaborated on "Aggie Pride". Her analysis should make Aggie students, alumni and fans proud. "It's all about brotherhood. Historically Aggies have had no problems in fighting for the things that they felt strongly about. The marches and the sit-ins are etched in history books across the country. History itself is in the walls of N.C. A&T State University", said Ms. Jenkins.
