

Black-Owned Gas Distributor Files Discrimination Suit

Black-owned and operated DAG Petroleum Companies, based in Washington, D.C., has recently filed a racial discrimination lawsuit against the United Kingdom's largest oil company, British Petroleum (BP). DAG decided to pursue the lawsuit citing the fact that in 1999, a BP CEO admitted his company's long history of discriminatory practices against various races. However, since that time, BP has grown to over 14,000 gas stations in the U.S., predominantly in Black neighborhoods with 181 in Washington, D.C. alone, but has yet to enter into any automotive fuel distributorship agreements with Blacks, nor has there been any advancement for Blacks within BP management positions. The lawsuit is seeking monetary damages and a mandate requiring BP to create and adhere to diversity policies.

More Black Families Home Schooling

According to the Home School Legal Defense Association, a national advocacy group, the percentage of Black home-schooling families has been on the rise in the past 10 years, due to parents' desires to guide their children's morals, inadequate teaching of Black history in schools and the stigmatizing of Black youth, particularly boys. The advocacy group also stated that the number of Black home-schooled children is still low compared to a national scale of approximately 1 million, because many Black families don't have the time or financial backing to conduct home school.
