The lectures are given under the auspices of the Charlotte branch of the American Association of University Women and will be open to the public. Until this year, Mrs. Townsend was for eight years a member of the English faculty of Queens-Chicora College.

The lectures will be of a general interest and will cover in survey the work of many of the country's contemporary poets, novelists and playwrights. The first lecture was "On Understanding Poetry." The second lecture on February 30, will be on poetry and will have the subject, "Then and Now." In this lecture Mrs. Townsend will speak on the differences between poets such as Longfellow, Whittier, Lanier, and others, and some of the modernsthe differences in theme and style and points of view.

The third lecture on March 16, will treat of some of the present-day men and women novelists. The fourth lecture on March 23 will be a discussion of the modern American theatre and some outstanding dramatists.
