Madeline Lotterhos will spend the holidays with Helen Douglas in Chesterfield, S. C.

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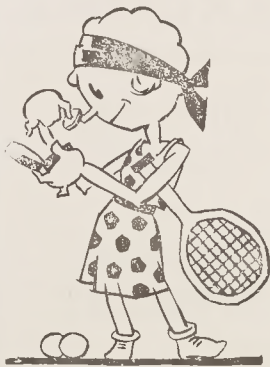
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
