"Each student has the privilege of signing a pledge at the end of orientation week by agreeing to accept these fundamentals and to abide by and uphold the regulations of the Honor System of the Student Government Association. Any girl who does not feel that she can pledge herself to carry out these standards is out of harmony with the ideals of Queens College and is ineligible to be enrolled as a member of the student body."
