

Observance of Traditional Service Closes Annual Series

Wednesday, March 19, Dr. Ben Lacy, President of Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, Virginia, Opened the annual spring services of Queens college.

He was first introduced to the student body at chapel. Dr. Hunter Blakley presented him as a man who deserves admiration because he has accomplished things. Dr. Lacy was a Rhodes scholar at Oxford University, and pastor of the first Presbyterian church in Atlanta before becoming President of the Seminary.

Dr. Lacy took the theme of his talk from Philipians 1:3-21, emphasizing this verse: "And this I pray that your love may bound yet more and more in knowledge and all judgement." "So many of the tragedies are due to loving well but not wisely," said Dr. Lacy. For this reason, he said, we should choose wisely a person who is worthy of our deepest love; and secondly we should, ourselves, love wisely. And so in the person whom we love and the manner in which we love, we should be sincere. If we love Christ with all our heart and soul and strength and mind, then by following Him, the "Crystal Christ," we too shall befinally to someone-"The Woman Who this series. Understands."
