

## A Million Man-Hours

Nearly three-fourths of the year, 1951 have passed with one of the best Safety Records ever established by the Caromount and Wilson Divisions.

Only two lost time accidents at Caromount stand in the way of a perfect record. Even with two accidents we have a chance to work 1,000,000 man hours at Caromount without a lost time accident. The last lost time accident occurred on March 16 and at the present rate of production we will round out a million man hours of production by the end of the year. A million man hours without a lost time accident is a record of which any plant can be extremely proud.

The Wilson Division so far has had no lost time accidents and if no lost time cases are suffered for the remainder of the year they will have an accident frequency of () which is the highest tribute to (Turn to Page Three)
