Okay. But—suppose the material is wasted . . . . grease stained, torn, dyed badly-and instead of selling that one yard of fabric, we have to throw it out and make another.

What happens? We're paying for two pieces of material. That means the price of the *finished product* has to go up. And when the price is higher, customers won't buy.

So we lose sales. Business drops off. Jobs grow less secure. Everyone gets hurt.

When waste cuts in, everybody loses.

Waste takes-never gives anything to anyone."
