SECRETARY OF WAR URGES UPKEEP OF EQUIPMENT

Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of War, called on Army personnel recently to strive to abolish mechanical failures in the machinery provided the Army by industry.

The Secretary cited the fact that maintenance of planes, trucks, and other vehicles is as important to the success of the Army as the physical fitness of its personnel.

"The Army supervises programs to insure the continuing health of its men and women," the Secretary pointed out. "Maintenance of the same degree of perfection in vehicles depends squarely on their crews.

"Whether you are in a training camp in the United States or in the forward line of a combat area, 'readiness for battle' must be the standard by which you judge the condition of this equipment which has been entrusted to your care."

"The whole long chain of production and supply—from assembly at the factory to delivery on a distant shore—is severed if a vehicle's high perfection is permitted to deteriorate through lack of responsible care."

"I call on every man and woman serving with the Army of the United States to unite in a campaign of preventive maintenance designed to abolish the menace of mechanical failures and to get the most from the fine machines which industry has provided."

"This is your responsibility. I depend on your judgment to see it through."

INCOME TAX

Q. Do I have to pay the tax on the \$26 the government adds to my allotment for my wife?

A. No. This is a gift of the government and is not taxable.

Q. I live off the post and receive subsistence allowance. Do I have to pay a tax on this?

A. No. Nor do you have to pay a tax on money received from the government for travel or equipment necessary to your job as a soldier.

Q. I am an officer. Do I have to pay a tax on my allowance for uniform?

A. No. Do not include this in your income. You may also deduct for other pieces of equipment such as corps devices, Sam Browne belts and campaign bars which were not included in your allowance.

Q. I do not wish to pay my tax this year. What do I do?

A. When you file your return, add a letter saying it would be a hardship to pay. The Treasury is lenient in judging what constitutes a "hardship."

Q. If I don't pay now, when will I have to?

A. Six months after you leave the service you must pay the tax in full.

Q. I am serving overseas. If I don't file a return now, when will I have to?

A. Your due date is the 15th day of the third month following the earliest one of these dates: (1) the month in which you return to the United States; (2) the month in which you leave the Army; (3) the month in which an executor of your estate is appointed in case of your death.





Under the new program, the men will be given courses in radio engineering, advanced aviation armament, advanced aerial photography and airplane engineering.

There are four schools for radio mechanics and engineering which will furnish candidates for the new program, two in aviation armament, one in aerial photography and 26 in airplane mechanics, including a number of civilian operated institutions.

Quotas to be furnished by each school will be fixed by the Commanding General, Army Air Forces Technical Training Command.

The men who will be commissioned upon successful completion of the new special aviation technical training courses, are to be chosen by the commanding officers of the enlisted men's schools. Their eligibility for the new courses will also be passed upon by

The men who will be commissioned upon successful completion of the new special aviation technical training courses, are to be chosen by the commanding officers of the enlisted men's schools. Their eligibility for the new courses will also be passed upon by aviation cadet boards which have been authorized to accept proficiency and general aptitude as a substitute for the heretofore required educational qualifications.

Those Air Forces Technical Training Schools now giving courses in radio mechanics, radio engineering and radio operation, in aviation armament, in aerial photography and in airplane mechanics will present their top graduates, selected by commanding officers, for admittance to the training program.
