## New Improvements To Be Made

After four war years during which little could be done, plans are now under way for making many needed improvements throughout the plant.

Foremost on the list is the repainting of every department. An engineer has inspected the entire mill and has recommended the application of Color Dynamics throughout. In reality, Color Dynamics is based on principles directly opposed to camouflage practices. To camouflage an object, color is used to hide and obscure; in Color Dynamics, color is used to highlight, reveal and emphasize.

In addition to brightening things up with paint, the present lighting system is to be revamped. Continuous lines of fluorescent light will be put in the knitting and looping departments, and the present lights upstairs will be distributed over other parts of the mill.

New fixtures have been placed in the rest rooms, and new wash fountains have already been ordered to replace the present sinks. Each department will have their own semi-circular, foot treadle operated wash fountain, which will help relieve the present congestion at the end of working hours.

As we all know, the mill gets rather warm in the summer. To correct this, a sprinkler system, guaranteed to reduce the heat from eight to twelve degrees, has already been placed on the roof of the main building and will also be placed on the boarding room and dye house when the re-roofing of this building is completed.

Last, but not least, we are going to have music while we work. A plant broadcaster has arrived and is to be installed, we hope, within the next two weeks. When this system is in operation, a survey will be run periodically to determine what type of music and recordings are preferred throughout the plant.

With these new impovements, and others which we plan to add later, we will be well on the way to making Harriss and Covington a more modern and up-to-date mill.
