HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS WILL NOT FIND WORK, HE DECLARES AT CONFERENCE OF AGENCIES

NEW YORK, January 19.—A post-war "lost" generation composed of young persons now at work who will be squeezed out of jobs by returning veterans was forecast on January 13 by Dr. Robert C. Lynd, Professor of Sociology at Columbia University.

Dr. Lynd spoke before 600 persons at a conference on youth in City Hall under the auspices of the Civilian Defense Volunteer Office and the Welfare Council of New York City, a federation of 600 social and health agencies.

The sociologist described the new "lost" generation as similar to that in Germany and Austria after World War I—"too young for the glory of having been to war and returned veterans."

BENEFIT PROJECT OPENS STORE TO NEEDY NEGRO

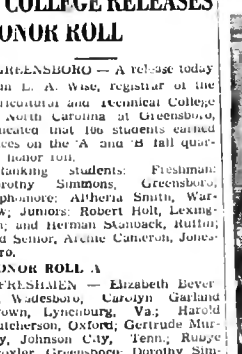

Proceeds from the small charge made for clothing purchased will be used to establish a scholarship fund for needy working mothers whose preschool children should use the store.
