Roger Baldwin Is Optimistic At Bennett

GREENSBORO — Optimism on the problems of race pervaded the address given here last week at Bennett College by Roger Baldwin, director of the American Civil Liberties Union. The speaker was presented by the Guilford County Interracial Commission.

Pointing out numerous instances of improved relations, the speaker expressed the firm belief that the emergence of these times would make this war end to all wars. He declared that the problem of building true democracy must be an international one, for without international solution there can be no national solution.

Based his observations upon recent months of travel throughout the south and southwest, he asserted that never before has there been such great interest in race problems and their adjustment. He reminded the audience of voting barriers which were recently broken down in Texas, which he said, is another evidence of improved relations.

In conclusion, Mr. Baldwin expressed the conviction that, in time, America will practice the kind of democracy that now professes and racial animosity between all races will be dissolved.

The speaker was introduced by Charles A. Hines, president of Guilford County Interracial. Rev. E. A. Hargett, pastor of St. Stephens Christian Church, Dr. A. D. Beittel of Guilford College, and Rev. R. D. Crockett of Bennett College assisted in the service. President David D. Jones of Bennett College presided.
