Roberts of Tuskegee Institute and Washington, D. C. Both were prominent in the field of agriculture, Mr. Charity, who dued on March 5, being a federal state agent with offices at Vir-ginia State College, aud Mr. Roberts, who died on March 3, being a special assistant to the director of personnel in the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
