Guaranteed — (Continued from page one) out after the first World War and in territories taken by the United Nations after this war, there is a trusteeship administered by the nations who held the mandate and by other interested nations, but there is no provision for Native representation. This failure to include Natives in the governing council does not carry out the stated objectives of the proposal to train the Natives for progressive development toward self government. Neither is there any provision for Native representation on territories voluntarily put under the trusteeship.
