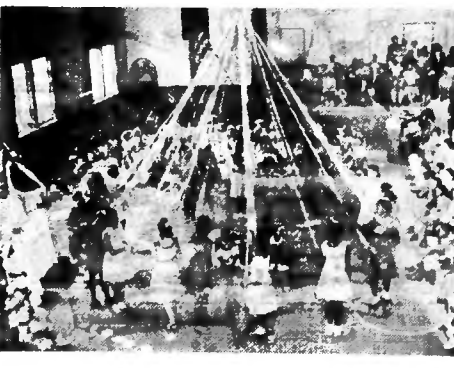

RALEIGH — The St. Augustine's Conference for Church Workers will hold its 36th annual session at St. Augustine's College, June 11 through June 15, but because of ODD travel regulations, out of town attendance will be limited to 50 persons. In co-operating with the Office of Defense Transportation's restrictions, officials of the Conference are inviting 25 leaders of youth work to participate in this year's session. As is customary in such cases, the individuals provided are asked to indicate promptly whether they will attend, so that alternates may be invited in place of any who decline the invitation. Members of the Conference faculty will include Bishop Edwin A. Penick of North Carolina; Bishop Bravil W. Harris, recently elevated for the Missionary District of Liberia; the Rev. John M.
