A Soldier Writes Letter Home To His Mother



Somewhere in Czechoslovakia, Dear Mother, I guess you think I have forgotten you but I haven't. I was waiting the time so I could write you every thing I'd tell you.

Well at last I can tell you a lot of things I'd like to say, the first thing is I am one of the lucky ones to be here after the last gun has been fired and boy am I glad. I was in a little town just getting ready to go up when all of a sudden the microphone started to blast off. Every one began to wonder what had happened, then we saw a number of autos go by, then we came out to see what was going on. We saw a lot of big shots coming up the street to surrender the German Army I don't know if it didn't seem any different to us. I don't know why. I guess it was because we had heard the rumor so many times, that we still didn't believe it. Somehow, I can't believe it now, only we get a little more rest now. And Mom do you know that I have driven so much in the dark, that I hardly know how to drive in the light now. I've driven over the whole country of Europe more than five times and when I say I don't mean skipping any highways, but every little road that a person could walk up. Since June 8, 1941 that is what I have been doing. It is over now for a while and I am glad. I just can't tell you all about it, but I'll tell you some things about it, and again somehow, I don't want to believe my eyes. I have been to see about half of the camps here and there are places there where they were shooting and that make you very uncomfortable. Now that I can see where I go at night I feel a bit funny (smile).
