Oconeechee Scout Camp to Open July 23rd

The Oconeechee Council Boy Scout Camp will open Monday, July 23rd and run through August 12th. From present pre-camp reservations it appears that over 300 of the 1000 Boy Scouts now registered will be in attendance. The camping period will be divided into three periods of one week each. No reservation can be accepted from any troops after July 20, 1945. The first period will begin with the noon meal on Monday July 23rd. G. F. Newell, Council Field Executive will serve as Camp Director. Dr. Val Hamlin, Jr., one of the 375 Scouters in the Oconeechee Council will serve as W. E. Front Director. The Camp will be operated on a Troop Camping Basis. Scouters will come to Camp with their Scouts and camp with them. These Courts of Honor will be held during the camping period. George J. Henders of Raleigh will supervise the preparing of meals.

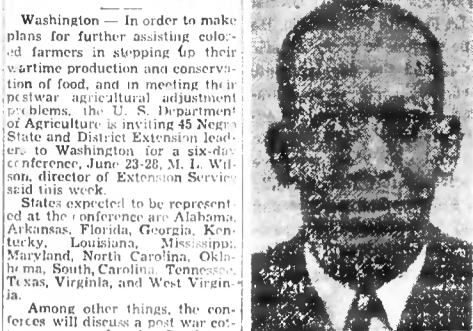
