NERO 4-H BOYS INVESTED IN WAR BONDS

Marion, S. C. — Thirteen Negro 4-H boys and girls have invested \$243.74 in War Bonds. They used money earned through the sale of hogs to make their purchases.

A county-wide campaign has been inaugurated by George Dean, Negro county agent here, through which 4-H boys and girls will spend a considerable portion of their earnings in the purchase of War Bonds.

Long Terms Meted In Attempted Rape Cases

TARBORO — On June 8, a Superior Court jury found one man and two boys guilty of attempted rape on three local white girls last spring. Each was given a long prison term.

Nathaniel Killebrew, 28, pleaded not guilty, but he was definitely identified by V. girl Sexton as her attacker on March 18, and the man was sentenced to from 10-15 years. He was frightened away by her screams, the girl testified.

James Bell, 17, pleaded guilty to attempted rape on two separate occasions, one against Mrs. Joe Long, and the other against Sarah Ravis. Neither attempt was successful. His sentence was 10-15 years on each count, the first sentence to be followed by the second.

A 10-15 year prison sentence was imposed on Willie Brown, who pleaded guilty to an attempted assault on Doris Miller on Jan. 20. Brown was with Bell when the latter attacked Miss Ravis. The two were arrested after bloodhounds were put on their trails.

MEASURE MILLIONTHS OF INCH

These films, like those of all an x-ray, are made on wet streets afford scientists a valuable thickness gage by the color they reflect, according to Dr. Katherine B. Blodgett, of General Electric's research laboratory. A thin film of oil on water has a yellow color when the film is six millionths of an inch thick, red for seven millionths and blue for eight millionths, she said. By using this information a color scale has been devised for measuring to millionths of an inch.

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WHITE SLAYER SENTENCED

RALEIGH — Ronald Perry, 34-year old white man, formerly of Wake Forest, was sentenced to from 14-17 years in State Prison for the murder of Lynn White, 20, four years ago. The defendant pleaded guilty to manslaughter.

Perry, sought by the police for four years, was arrested recently near Roxboro when an informant tipped off the police. He offered no explanation for the killing, but evidence showed that Perry killed White following an argument over bootleg whiskey.

The slaying was just about forgotten by the officials here as there was no record of the case. No death certificate and no burial permit were found for White and no record of him could be ascertained at Saint Agnes Hospital where he died.

A lone witness — Joe Bailey of New Light Township, was found, however, and testified that Perry was the instigator of their argument. Judge Lawson L. Williams termed the killing "unprovoked" and Perry approached the maximum sentence of 20 years.

Probable Cause Found Against Driver

RALEIGH — Lonnie Upchurch of 721 Bragg Street, and Marshall Allen, 722 Bragg Street were bound over to Wake Superior Court last week under \$100 bond after probable cause was found in cases in which they were charged with assault with a deadly weapon, resulting in death.

The charges grew out of a recent accident between a truck and a car driven by the defendants, which resulted in a fatal death for one man and the subsequent death of another. The accident occurred on East Street, just south of the Carrurus Street intersection.

Ernest Hughes of 111 South Haywood Street died at the scene of the wreck. Dan McFarland of 1122 Smith Street died several hours later at Saint Agnes Hospital.

The two men got in Upchurch's car at the intersection when he offered them a ride.

Bell-Hop Draws Jail Term in Shooting Case

RALEIGH — Lee Moore, a bell-hop in a local hotel, was found guilty in Criminal Court last week of assault with a deadly weapon and was sentenced to 18 months in jail.

Last March the defendant blasted four bullets into the body of Willie Hartfield, who Moore said, had accused him of larceny of a watch from a mutual girl friend and had threatened his life. The two met one night on West Davis Street and Moore opened fire. Hartfield was wounded in the shoulder, once in the hip and twice in one leg. He received treatment at Saint Agnes Hospital and was discharged on June 10.

Moore was permitted to serve his sentence in the Wake County Jail as a helper for the jail.

REV. H. L. ARBE ADDRESSER CULTELE, RELIGIOUS BUSINESS MEN CLUB FAYETTEVILLE

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Pres. Seabrook And Rev. Funderburk Finals Speakers At So. Pines

SOUTHERN PINES — The commencement events of West Southern Pines High School were highlighted by President J. W. Seabrook, president Fayetteville State Teachers' College and Rev. J. R. Funderburk, P. E. Fayetteville district.

In delivering the baccalaureate sermon, he was sound and practical. He compared the lives and future careers of the graduating class to a baseball game. A good offense, teamwork, and the will to win were the basic points stressed by him. Integrity, industriousness, courtesy, and common sense were compared respectively to the four bases, the players, the run, and the ball.

"Does Man Learn by Experience?" The fact that man so often makes the same mistake repeatedly, was vividly illustrated by a second world's war that now exists in the universe.

The value of time, health and sound bodies, and optimism was highly considered by the speaker. Time, because it is the stuff of which life is made, and because no one will ever be able to invest a clock that will strike the hours lost in frivolity; health and sound bodies because our bodies are temples of the living God and must be kept clean; and optimism because our conditions are often not nearly as bad as the other fellows — A man might grumble about having no shoes until he meets another man who has no feet — things can always be worse.

President Seabrook left this final thought: "Man has changed himself so little in a world that he has changed so much" that we should always strive to change ourselves as well as the world for the better.
