ST. AUGUSTINE'S COLLEGE CELEBRATES ANNIVERSARY — The staff and student body gathered with representatives of the alumni and a cabinet from St. Augustine Hospital and Training School for nurses in a banquet which began the celebration of the 75th anniversary of St. Augustine's College January 12.

The Rev. Edgar H. Goff, president of the college, presided at the banquet. Some high lights of the recent history of the institution were presented by Dean Cecil D. Hollibart, who remarks included mention of the 13 staff members whose length of continuous service at St. Augustine's ranges from 12 to 40 years. Mr. M. M. Latham, dean of women, and Prof. Reginald Lynch, assistant academic dean, topped the list, with 40 and 26 years, respectively.

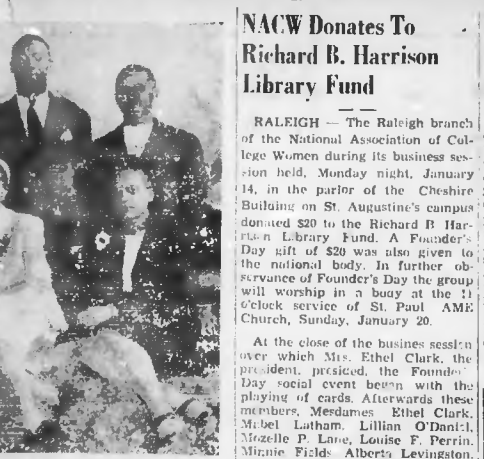
