## VETS ASK END TO RANKIN COMMITTEE

**NEW YORK (AP)** — A petition calling for the abolition of the Senate Committee on Un-American activities, circulated by the Veterans Against Discrimination, is their answer to letters sent last week by Eddie Adamson, chief counsel of the committee. Mr. Adamson informed the veterans, "The United States can never become democratic without anchoring the Constitution and that the committee itself will always be the judge as to whether or not a organization is engaged in subversive or un-American activities."

According to Lawrence Rivkin, chairman of Veterans Against Discrimination, "When a so-called representative of the people, John Rankin, attacks our democracy, makes insulting anti-Semitic remarks on the floor of congress and uses a house committee to stimulate hatred against Negroes, Jews and other minority groups, it is time for the people to grieve. We veterans know what segregation did to Europe. We fought it there and we will continue to fight it here."

The petition is a four-page document addressed to the house of representatives demanding the abolition of the committee on un-American activities and urging the individual representatives to sign Discharge Petition No. 12 which would make that possible. The petition quotes Adamson's remarks on democracy and his suggestion to the Veterans Against Discrimination that they become more familiar with the history of the United States. On one page there are four quotations of Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Gen. Dwight Eisenhower and Franklin D. Roosevelt on the question of democracy. The veterans gave their answer stating that such remarks by a congressional body is not only insulting and absurd, but it is the language of fascism.

Copies of the petition, which will be brought to Washington by a mass delegation of veterans, may be secured at Veteran Against Discrimination, Hotel Diplomat, 108 W. 4th street, New York City.

Just this week from the NAACP, the NAACP resolved to ban all voted against abolishing the poll tax, against discontinuation of the Dixie committee supported Congressman Rankin's amendment of the Veterans Administration, voted against continuation of the poll tax, opposed travel pay for located war workers and minor government reorganization for federal aid. He also voted to overrule the Presidential veto of the anti-strike bill in 1943.

Representative of all the Negroes, Long Island branches of the NAACP met in the national office February 21 to plan further action in cooperation with other organizations.

## Barrington Dunbar To Be Asst. Director Displaced Persons Camp

**WASHINGTON, D. C.** — Barrington Dunbar, well-known Negro agricultural worker and pioneer in the vocational guidance work sponsored by New York City in 1935 has entered the USRRA Training Center in Washington, D. C. to prepare for the assignment of Assistant Director of a displaced persons camp somewhere in Germany.

A native of Granville, British Columbia, Mr. Dunbar was educated at New York City College and Columbia where he has completed doctorate requirements, and is a naturalized U. S. citizen. Besides vocational guidance among Negroes and other students and settlement house work, he has specialized in migratory labor camp management working with Bahamian and Jamaican as well as domestic migratory laborers.

In New York between 1935 and 1938, Mr. Dunbar was associated with the City Home Relief Bureau and the Works Progress Administration. In the course of which he was asked to set up and manage a cooperative living experiment for a group of New York University students. Mr. Dunbar came to Washington, D. C., in 1938 as Program Director of the Smithfield House, a neighborhood settlement hall during the war was instrumental in organizing the Civilian Defense program.

The Displaced Persons Camps in Germany for which Mr. Dunbar is bound after he completes a three month course at the UNRRA Training Center in Washington, were established to care for homeless war-sufferers in Europe particularly those whose lives were disrupted by Nazi terrorism and encirclement. The Military Government has the responsibility of supplying these people with food, clothing and shelter but the UNRRA team of workers are charged with assisting the Military in administering the camps, distributing supplies, running the hospitals and medical clinics, supervising education, welfare and recreational facilities, and running training bureaus to find missing relatives.

Mr. Dunbar's background, experience and success in labor camp management and community organization work, rendered him admirably well suited for the job of helping run a displaced persons camp — an assignment which from all reports of UNRRA work abroad is a real challenge to the talents of the ablest sociologists. Mr. Dunbar is younger brother to Raphael Dunbar, internationally known symphony orchestra leader. Mr. Raphael Dunbar is a Columbia University alumna who later studied at the Conservatory of Paris. He has performed his musical career in Europe for the past 12 years and

is now back in New York.



