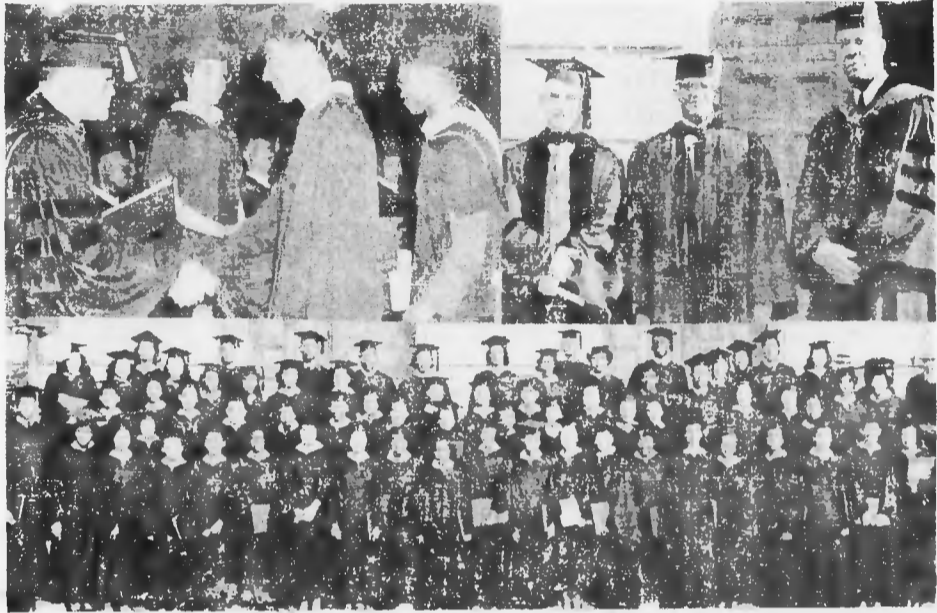

NEWS FLASH: RUSSIA JAILS RACE BAITERS FOR TROUBLE-ACTION

CHICAGO (ANP) — So strict is Russia's anti-racist legislation that Soviet courts have sentenced 2 white Americans to jail for trying to practice jim crow in that country. "No Racism in Russia," a feature article in the June issue of Negro Digest written by Carlisle Lamont, declares that the people of all races and colors associate freely. Advancing racial hatred or contempt as a direct violation of the constitution, it is quickly prosecuted by governmental authorities. Lamont says that two white Americans were arrested and convicted for insulting an American Negro in a Russian dining hall. The court handed down a two-year sentence against the defendants for this attempt to practice jim crow in the Soviet.
