

NEWS FLASH: RUSSIA JAILS RACE BAITERS FOR TROUBLE-ACTION

CHICAGO (AP)—So strict is Russia's anti-racist legislation that Soviet courts have sentenced 2 white Americans to jail for trying to practice jim crow in that country. "No Racism in Russia," a feature article in the June issue of Negro Digest written by Carlisle Lamont, declares that the people of all races and colors associate freely. Advancing racial hatred or contempt as a direct violation of the constitution, it is quickly prosecuted by governmental authorities.
