USHERS IN ANOTHER TALMADGE ERA

Atlanta (ANP) — Another Talmadge era was ushered in the state Wednesday.

Returns from the state's 174 precincts indicate that 61-year-old Eugene Talmadge, race baiting political antics were more popular than 40-year-old Ellis Arnall's liberalism. His gubernatorial victory, marking his fourth in his stormy political career, is based on county unit votes rather than popular votes.

The county unit votes, similar to the electoral system, is the only thing that counts in Georgia's gubernatorial election. Tabulation late Thursday night gave Talmadge 234 county unit votes, 28 more than is necessary for nomination, against 128 unit votes for 36-year-old Jas. W. Carmichael, Gov. Arnall's progressive candidate.

Marmichael, however, received the popular vote, leading Talmadge by 307, 126 to 286, 751 Former Gov. E. D. Rivers had totaled 67, 196 for third and Joske O'Kelly, 11,527. More than 100,000 Negroes are reported to have voted for the first time in defiance of pre-election warnings from Talmadge for "wise" Negroes to stay away from the polls.

A multitude of 18-year-olds made the primary voting unusually heavy. In addition to the unit votes in counties which have completed

RALEIGH — An assertion under oath by John Bell Sanders, 16-year-old Wendell youth, that he had been mistreated by a Wendell police officer while under arrest, and that he had been investigated by Solicitor W. Plans In Effect To Better Facilities at A. & T. College

GREENSBORO — When the state's advisory budget commission visited this city last week for biennial inspection tour of state institutions preparatory to drafting the appropriation bill for the 1947 general assembly, A. & T. College presented it with a permanent improvement budget amounting to \$1,986,345 for the two-year period, 1947-1949.

Talmadge-Fired Persons; Destroy Many Churches

Spartanburg, Ga. (ANP) — A former white school, which had been turned over to Negroes for use as a church and school building, had been burned down Wednesday by persons aroused to fury by Talmadge speeches and writings, according to reports.

The Cross Roads had been abandoned and consolidated with the school at Spartanburg. The land reverted to the owner under terms of the deed, and he informed county authorities he would turn over the empty and abandoned school building to Negroes for use as a church and school.

The day after the first church services in the building, it was burned to the ground.

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
