VIRGIN ISLES GOES DEMOCRATIC

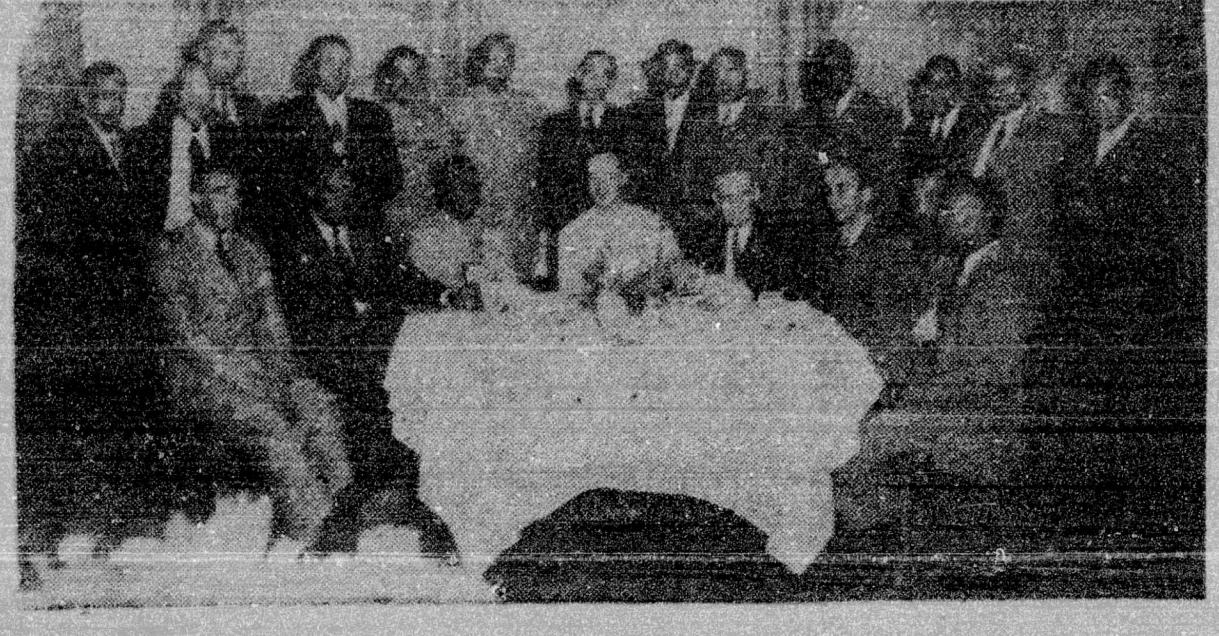

RACE EXCLUDED; JIM CROWD IN VA HOSPITALS

WASHINGTON, D. C.—In twelve Veterans Administration hospitals colored veterans are not admitted at all except in cases of emergency, and of 10,012 colored veterans hospitalized in other VA facilities as of August 31, 4,379 or nearly 50 per cent were receiving medical care under Jim Crow conditions, a Veterans Administration report showed last Friday.
