COLUMBIA, S. C. (ANP) — Among the 15 resolutions adopted by the Southern Negro Youth Congress in its closing session here last Tuesday were two which asked the "immediate removal" of James P. Byrnes from office of secretary of state, and refusal to seat Sen. Bilbo.

ACQUITTED IN WHIPPING CASE

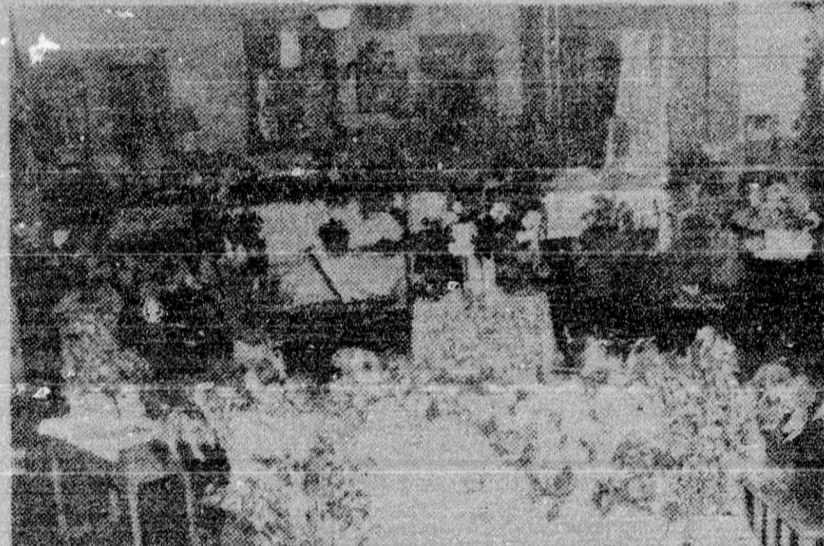

KILGORE CALLS FOR COOPERATION AMONG BAPTISTS

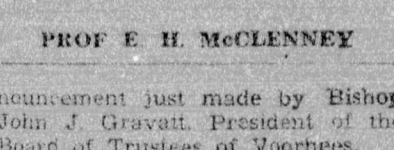
