

"MILITARY INTELLIGENCE OPEN"

RALEIGH — Direct assignment of qualified personnel to the Army's Military Intelligence Service in the Far Eastern Command is NOW open, Sgt. Sparks, Commanding Officer of the local Army Recruiting Station announced today. Sgt. Sparks also stated that applicants for this assignment must be able to READ, WRITE and SPEAK the Russian or Korean Language fluently. A new directive from Headquarters, Third Army, Atlanta, Ga., states that applicants with prior service that are qualified for enlistment under this directive will be enlisted as technicians fifth grade or in a grade according to their training and experience. Applicants existing for this assignment without prior service will be sent to the Army's Training Center, Fort Ord, California, for complete training and processing. Applicants successfully completing their training and screening tests, and assigned to the Military Intelligence Service will be given promotions in grades according to their ability and proficiency. All applicants must enlist for three years in the Regular Army. GA. TEACHERS SEEK EQUAL SALARY BASIS

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP) — The Georgia Teachers' Association last week pledged efforts toward abolition of one-teacher schools. A saved state college maintained by public funds and a uniform salary basis for teachers.

Meeting here April 16-17 at Spencer High School, C. W. DeVall, principal of the teachers heard Dr. H. E. Mays, president of Morehouse College, in a keynote address. "Thinking a clear and logical analysis of the present plight, moral rather than political, economic or educational and stated that the remedy lies with the schools and churches, were the fundamentals of right living must be stressed.

FLAT FEET NO LONGER RACIAL CLASSIFICATION

WASHINGTON (AP) — A directive has recently been issued by the Veterans' administration, announcing that certain physical conditions such as "flat feet" would no longer be listed as a "racial characteristic."

The directive issued by O. W. Clark, executive assistant administrator, by the direction of the administrator, was the result of a statement appearing in Charles Cheek's column of the Chicago Defender about two weeks ago.

The statement, which was brought to the attention of a VA official, pointed out that "a misconception in Veterans' administration listed flat feet as characteristics of the Negro race."

Cheek's further stated that "flat feet come from injury breaking down supporting tissue and allowing bones to sag." Bone sag just as quickly in overworked white feet as in flat feet said the columnist.

Dr. Montague W. Cobb, anthropologist and professor at the Howard Medical school, who assisted in giving army tests to 5,000 white and 2,000 Negro soldiers substantiated Cheek's statement. The results of "flat feet" tests, said Dr. Cobb, proved that the arches of both Negro and white feet vary from very low, and that flat feet are not necessarily indications of flat feet. Many

WHITE JURY RULES AGAINST JC CURTAINS

LOUISVILLE (AP) — An all-white jury last week ruled against the practice of railroad Jim Crow during car curtains by awarding two Negro passengers \$800 in a \$25,000 suit against the Louisville and Nashville Railroad company.

The two-day trial was climaxed by an impassioned appeal to the democratic consciousness of white jurymen by Atty. Charles W. Anderson Jr., a member of the state legislature who pointed out that the "unwritten democratic principle was more important than the \$25,000 which he suggested be reduced to a \$500 judgment.

Swayed by his argument, the jury, headed, then returned a verdict of James E. Stokes of Chicago, president of the Fisk University Alumni association and Ennis L. Powell of Charleston, W. Va., the Supreme Liberty Life Insurance Company's manager for the state of West Virginia, who were charged the right to eat breakfast outside the Jim Crow dining car curtains on the Louisville and Nashville Railroad's train on March 17 although all the tables behind the curtain were occupied and vacant tables remained in the so-called "white" section of the diner.

Stamps and Powell were returning home from an executive committee meeting of the Fisk University

They attempted to sit down at the vacant table, they testified, but were prevented from doing so by the steward, who told them they could only sit at the two tables reserved for colored people. Negro waiters supported the steward's testimony that if they waited a few minutes they could be served in the "colored" section.

accept breakfast in their dining room, one waiter said. Aiden Stamps and Powell declined a second offer to be served behind the Jim Crow tables because they did not have time to finish their meal before reaching their destinations, they said.
