RACE BARS NEGRO GIRL FROM PHILA. NURSES SCHOOLS

PHILADELPHIA (ANP) — An 18-year-old girl who wants to be a nurse at a time when hospitals, the Red Cross and the armed services and other agencies are begging for nurses this week found herself unable to get into a nursing school in this city because she is a Negro.

Miss Pauline Jackson, 18, of Germantown, a graduate of Downingtown Industrial school, is the girl who cannot go to school.

Her first rejection came from the Women's Homeopathic hospital, a state institution with a 95 percent Negro patients rate. Although Miss Jackson passed the entrance exams to the Temple hospital school she received the following letter from Lelah M. Sitterly, director of the school:

"We regret to inform you that we do not receive Negro students but we may take this opportunity to inform you that the schools which are listed below accept Negro student nurses."

"We recommend you especially to the Lincoln School of Nursing, one of the best schools of nursing in the United States, where only Negro students are accepted."

The letter listed a number of eastern schools and then closed:

"I hope you will find the above satisfactory, and that you will realize your ambition to become a registered nurse. Lelah M. Sitterly, R. N."

Miss Jackson then applied to the Jewish hospital and the Chestnut Hill Hospital. The Jewish hospital told her that "only a qualified number of Negro nursing trainees would be accepted by the school, selecting only those of high scholastic standing."

"The quota at this school was 30, and had been filled until September, 1949," Chestnut Hill told her that it was filled over 75 percent of time extending over several semesters."

Miss Jackson is still hoping to go to a nursing school.

Aged Man Is Rescued From South St. Home

An aged man, identified as Sylvester Chavis, was taken to St. Agnes Hospital Friday night after a passing motorist pulled him from his burning bed in a small woodshed on East South Street where he was living.

The rescue was made by J. H. Duncan, Carolina Coach Company garage foreman, and Bruce Poole, assistant warden at Central Prison. Fire Chief A. B. Lloyd reported, as Duncan and Poole happened to be riding by when the flames flashed through the cracks and a window in the shed.

Duncan said he used a hand extinguisher which he had in his automobile to put out the fire and that he and Poole then carried the man from the smoldering building.

Chavis said he is partially crippled and was unable to leave the shed himself. The shed is an outbuilding located near 328 East South Street which was apparently gutted when Chavis fell asleep while smoking.

SCHOOL LAND IS DONATED BY ALABAMA FIRM

BIRMINGHAM (ANP) — The Woodard Iron company added another bit to its contribution to bettering facilities for Negro education here last week by giving the Jefferson county school board 26 1/2 acres of land to be used as the site for a new state Negro vocational school. The school, to be located in the Wenonah-Powderly area, will be adjacent to the newly constructed Wenonah high and elementary schools, which stand on 13 1/2 acres also contributed by the iron company.

The deed to the new site was presented to Dr. John E. Bryant, county superintendent, representing the state department of education, by Hewitt Smith, vice-president of Woodard Iron. Also present was Dr. I. F. Simmons, who succeeds Dr. Bryant next month, and O. G. Gresham, president of the county board of education.

The proposed vocational school is expected to offer education in trades to more than 500 Negro students from the Birmingham area and throughout the state. The elementary and high schools are to work in close cooperation with it. The trade school will be the second in a series provided by acts of the state legislature, and will be the only state vocational institution operated for Negroes. The first trade school, set aside for white students, is located in the Dethan area.

According to Dr. Bryant, \$750,000 has been made available by the state for erecting and equipping the new schools. In addition it has an annual operation appropriation of \$7,500. The school is expected to be completed early next year.

More than 1,200 students attend the Wenonah high and elementary schools are a part of an 85-acre site now owned by the state and county educational system.
