Oatmeal Cookie Mix Makes 8 dozen cookies 3 cups sifted flour 2½ cups sugar 1 cup shortening 3 cups rolled oats (quick) 1 teaspoon soda

1 teaspoon baking powder 2 teaspoons salt or old fashioned, uncooked) Sift flour, soda, baking powder, salt and sugar together three times. Cut shortening into sifted dry ingredients until mixture re-sembles corn meal. Add rolled oats and mix well. Store in a covered container at room temperature. To make 2 dozen cookies:

2 cups Oatmeal Cookie Mix I tablespoon milk 1 teaspoon vanilla Add egg, milk and vanilla to mix. Beat until well blended. Drop a teaspoon onto greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven (375°F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Variations:

1. Add 1/2 cup chopped nutmeats, raisins, coconut, or chocolate chips * to prepared batter. Bake as directed above.

Add I teaspoon cinnamon and 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg to dry mix;

INVITE STUDENTS TO UN INSTITUTE

MIAMI (ANP) - Students of Flordia's Negro Colleges were offered an extraordinary experience in practical race relations when representatives were invited to at tend the second annual Florida institute on United Nations. The invitation which came as a direct result of the suggestion of white university students here, was extended to Florida Agricultural and Mechanical College, Tallahassee; Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach; Forida Normal, St. Augustine and Edward Waters College, Jacksonville.

The four-day institute will be held at a white hotel on Miami Beach. Lecturers of various nationalities will discuss a wide range of subjects related to the United Nation's role in world problems Topics include, "The Function of the United Nations," "South American Trade Relations," "The Challenge of UNESCO," "UN Past and Future," and "Interpretation of Russian Culture." Background lectures on the UN character will be given during the course of the in-

The state board revoked his license September 15 when a federal court convicted him of violating the federal narcolics

In his suit, Dr. Drake said that "any such violation was unwillful" on his part.

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
