DRUG CLERK SEEKS SERVICE FOR NEGRO FRIEND, IS JAILED

INDIANAPOLIS (ANP) — Lawrence Novick, white Allison employe, who tried to have a Negro friend served at a Haags drugstore has just been fired from his job. First, at the court trial, he was found guilty of vagrancy and fined \$5 and costs and his sentence is being appealed by Atty. Willard B. Ransom, state NAACP head. Then Novick was called into the front office of Allison's and fired for "unsatisfactory work."

The case against the drug-store manager for discrimination was dismissed due to failure of the prosecuting witnesses to appear but they have sworn that they were not notified of the hearing. "Errors of similar nature have clouded the other two civil rights suits brought against Indianapolis businessmen. However the local NAACP plans to intensify its fight for equality in actually as well as on the statute books.

AJC OFFICER CALLS FOR AID OF NATION IN ANTI BIAS DRIVE

Robert H. "Bobby" Slawson, executive vice president of the American Jewish Committee, spoke at a recent luncheon meeting of the New York Chapter of the American Jewish Committee at the Hotel Marlborough at which Col. Harold Ringelmann, chairman of the chapter, presided.

Pointing out that America's population of 145,000,000 includes members of a hundred different religious sects and 60 national origin groups, Dr. Slawson asserted that it is imperative to transform suspicion and hostility into trust and affection for members of all groups "if we are to learn to live together and be a strong nation."

Primary schools, educational institutions and the home must be enlisted in this battle, Dr. Slawson said, because "science reveals that by the age of one well-formed prejudice patterns toward other groups are already discernible."

With the election over, the forward march to advance the basic rights stressed in the Report of the President's Committee on Civil Rights will be intensified, Dr. Slawson asserted. "As the years go on, children will be born in a new culture where discrimination will become less and less an experience in the daily life of the child as a result of the institution and propagation of these basic rights," he emphasized.

"When this happens, trust and good will toward the other groups of racial and religious — will become a matter of course. This is the best form of education a child can have — growing up in a culture where discrimination is frowned upon and prohibited and an understanding relationship with members of all groups in our American society becomes the order of the day.

Trust, propaganda as such will become less and less a factor as a tool in promoting democracy. Education through a living experience will take its place."

The American Jewish Committee, founded forty-two years ago, combats bigotry and promotes democratic principles in the United States, protects the civil and religious rights of Jews overseas, and furthers Jewish cultural, religious and communal interests in that country.

U. N. INCREASES BUNCHE POWERS

PARIS (ANP) — Dr. Ralph Bunche, acting mediator for the United Nations Security Council in the Palestine issue, who was upped to the post when Count Folke Bernadotte was assassinated, emerged last week as an enormously powerful force in the conflict between Israel and the Arab states.

He has been granted vast powers in dealing with the two forces which include the authority to move against whichever side he pleases and the right to call upon the UN Security Council sanctions committee of seven to decree any punishment he thinks desirable for
