They alleged that the Hill girls' parents had been sent to New York following her death and

that illegal operations had been performed upon both white and Negro for fees ranging from \$100 to \$500.

Dr. Davis flatly denied these charges stating that he had had

no connection with the decision of the Hill girls' family to leave the county and that at no time during his 30-year practice has he received a fee of more than \$400 from any one family.

Outstanding Career
Dr. Davis, who has been outstanding in the business, professional and civic life of the state for many years, has been listed in "Who's Who in America" since 1925, "Who's Who in World Medicine" since 1947.

He graduated from Shaw University in 1911, attended the Leonard Medical College for three years, graduated with honors from Meharry Medical College, interned at the St. Agnes Hospital and did postgraduate medical work in the leading medical and surgical clinics of the nation.

Active in the affairs of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, he has served several terms as president of the Raleigh and Wake County branches.

He served 14 years as president of the BTU of North Carolina, is a deacon in the Baptist Church and is a former president of the N. C. Medical Association, and is now publicity director for the association after having held all of its other offices.

He is a member of the following medical societies: N. C. Medical Society, Eastern Carolina, Cape Fear Society, Nat'l Medical-Surgical Society, National Medical Association, and the National Association of Insurance Medical Examiners.

Following the indictment of Dr. Davis his attorneys immediately filed a demand for a bill of particulars on the charges against him.

Dr. Davis' bond was signed by 16 white and colored residents of Wake County.

The Solicitor's office stated that the trial is not expected to come up until the next term of court because of the necessity for bringing the Hill family down from New York to serve as witnesses.

the closing of one block of Worth between Church and Smith as well as of an undeveloped block of Church between Worth and Boundary.

In this connection School Superintendent Jesse O. Sanderson pointed out that the use of this site would provide land to meet the city's high school needs for at least the next quarter century.

Touching upon the cost of the proposed plot, however, Mr. Sanderson said that the cost of the proposed site could be reduced materially by omitting a 1-1/2 acre section of the proposed plot.

While the Raleigh Housing Authority already has title to the bulk of the plot and the city has options upon the rest, the 1-1/2 acre section under discussion which would entail an expenditure of approximately \$40,000, Mr. Sanderson said.

In urging that this portion of the proposed site be dropped to keep costs down, the school superintendent said that the remaining acreage would be "adequate" for the site.

This suggestion precipitated a half-hour discussion among members of the city council and members of the citizens committee who argued that failure to acquire this area upon which 13 houses are now located would detract materially from the appearance and opportunity for development of the site.

Following the discussion the proposal was turned over to the council's planning and zoning committee for consideration.

Objections to the present Washington High School site are based upon the fact that it is removed from the center of the Negro population of the city, that its possibilities for expansion are circumscribed and that it is in the midst of a semi-shum neighborhood.

along with the plan has resulted in strong criticism against the institution and is president by other Negro educators and leaders who charged that the move was a sell-out of the fight against educational Jim Crow.

The regional school plan, which was conceived at a meeting of the Southern Governors at Asheville in 1947, has been bitterly attacked by its foes as a step which is aimed solely at least nominally equal educational facilities for the two races without the dropping of the South's traditional patterns of racial segregation.

Under the plan states would be enabled to pool their financial resources to build educational systems which would carry out the letter of the U. S. Supreme court's mandate for equal school facilities.

Although many of the southern states have been moving slowly toward equality of undergraduate facilities for a number of years, it is generally conceded that equality above the graduate level represents a financial impossibility for the individual states un-
