

THE DUKE TRIUMPHS ON DOWN BEAT POLL

BAND IS VOTED MOST POPULAR IN ANNUAL POLL

CHICAGO.—Duke Ellington and his band received more awards in the annual Down Beat poll than any other group. In the annual results, Duke's band was second in sales, second in record sales, and third in radio popularity.

The band has won a number of Down Beat polls in the past and is now second among its members.

In addition to this Duke himself was named favorite piano player, in which a pianist is chosen regardless of instrument. This is significant, for while Ellington's jazz piano is well known to fans, he is best known as a conductor and composer having made comparative few solo records.

First, second and third place winners in the poll (members of the Ellington group indicated by an asterisk in front of their names) are: Favorite band—Duke Ellington; Stan Kenton; Lionel Hampton.
