ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—Joe Lewis is leading in both among Negro athletes and others to determine the "10 Outstanding Negro Athletes of All Time." Second to him is the great track star of the '30s, Jesse Owens. In appearance Negro athletes—the writer of the "Wiz Kids" column of the St. Louis Post Dispatch—placed them as follows:

No. 2—JOE LOUIS, because of his knockout record.

No. 3—JESSE OWENS, outstanding Negro track and field athlete of any day.

No. 4—WILLIAM H. LEWIS, twice named to the all-American football teams of Walter Camp and last year Negro ever to be so honored.

No. 5—SAM LANGFORD, first jockey ever to ride three Kentucky Derby winners.

No. 6—SAM LANGFORD, one of the best heavyweight fighters the world has known—and that goes without saying to race color or what race you are. Not even Jack Johnson in his prime dared to take on Langford.

No. 7—JACKIE ROBINSON, the first major league Negro player whose merit gained him the respect of all baseball enthusiasts as a top and on-the-map man.
