

Joe Louis Rated First Among 10 Top Race Athletes

BROWN BOMBER HOLD LEAD OVER OWENS, LEWIS

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—Joe Louis is leading a poll among sports writers and others to determine the "10 Outstanding Negro Athletes of All Time." Second to him is the great basketball star of the 30's, Jesse Owens. In approval of Negro athletes, the writer of "Who's Column" of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch listed them as follows:

No. 1—JOE LOUIS, because of his incomparable record.

No. 2—JESSE OWENS, outstanding Negro track and field athlete of any day.

No. 3—WILLIAM H. LEWIS, twice named to the all-American football team of Walter Camp and the first Negro ever to be so honored.

No. 4—ISAAC MURPHY, first Negro ever to ride three Kentucky Derby winners.

No. 5—SAM LANGFORD, the "Platoon" Babe, one of the best heavyweight fighters the world has known—and that goes without saying in race, color or what have you. Not even Jack Johnson is his price called to ride on Langford.

No. 6—JACKIE ROBINSON, the first Negro major league player whose merit earned him the respect of all race favorite associates as a top player in any team's lineup.

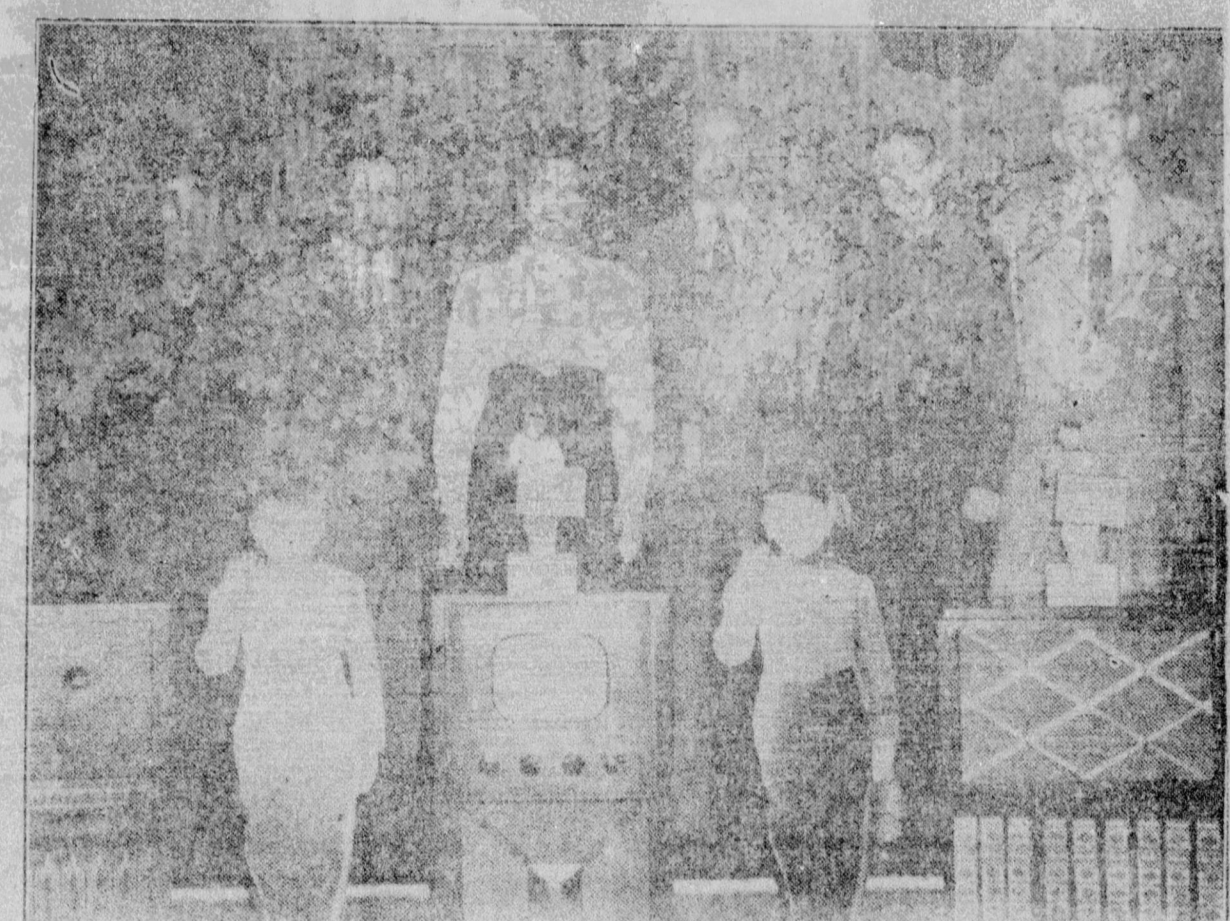

Klan Or No Klan, Jackie And Roy Can Play VS. Crackers

BROOKS STARS MAY IGNORE MOB'S WARNING

ATLANTA, Ga. — Klan or no Klan, Jackie Robinson and Roy Campanella of the Brooklyn Dodgers have a right to play, both against white Crackers of the Atlanta White Crackers, that is here in the home city of Dr. Samuel Green, grand dragon of the Klan.

Branch Rickey, president of the Dodgers, recently announced that when the Dodgers, starting from their spring drills in Florida in April, play the Crackers, he will trade Negro star Jackie Robinson to the Atlanta White Crackers.

Then, he said, Dr. Green had a right to play, both against white Crackers of the Atlanta White Crackers, that is here in the home city of Dr. Samuel Green, grand dragon of the Klan.
