

Wife Of Raleigh Medic Resigns League Post

ATLANTA, Ga. — Mrs. Isobel Chisholm Clark, director of promotion and publicity, National Urban League, Southern Field Division, resigned her position with the staff on January 3, effective February 1. She is the wife of Dr. W. F. Clark of Raleigh, N. C. They were wed on Christmas Day, 1948.

During the past year and a half Mrs. Clark has served in this public relations capacity throughout the Southern Region and in other States on special assignment, with headquarters in Atlanta. Her assignments included a period of interpretation, promotion and publication of National Urban League activities, functioning in support of the program and the organization of Urban League Guilds.

Prior to her appointment on the National Urban League staff, she was executive director of the Y. W. C. A. Branch in New Orleans, La. During her three and one-half years as YWCA executive, a building fund campaign for \$200,000 was launched and successfully completed. The new YWCA building is presently under construction.

Mrs. Clark also served as program director of YWCA branches in Columbus, Ohio and Kansas City, Mo.

She is a graduate of both Howard University and the Atlanta University School of Social Work, and completed the training course for YWCA directors at Oberlin College. She has done additional study at the University of Pennsylvania and Ohio State University, and for one year attended the Group Work Supervisory Seminar of the Talane University School of Social Work as a guest student.

In 1947 Mrs. Clark was selected one of eight in "Who's Who Among Outstanding Howard University Women graduates."

She is a member of the American Association of Social Workers and the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority and many other civic and social groups.

The former Miss Isobel Chisholm is a native of Philadelphia, Pa. She was married to Dr. William Freeman Clark, physician and surgeon of Raleigh, N. C., and is resigning her position to make her home in Raleigh after February 7th.
