CIVIL RIGHTS IS MAIN TOPIC FOR CHURCH PARLEY

Cleveland, O. (ANP) — A special meeting of 400 picked delegates is being held here this week (Mar. 8-11), by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America to determine the religious attitudes toward human rights.

Ministers and other church leaders of every color and numerous ecumenical groups will take the stand on the United States' moral role in the UN and its relations with Europe and the far east. One of the basic topics of discussion is the question of civil rights in the world today.

Among the leading speakers on the program is the Rev. J. C. Austin, pastor of Chicago's Pilgrim Baptist Church and a leader in the National Baptist convention.

Other highlights of the meeting include a parade of capped and gowned Negro and white ministers from the Cleveland hotel to the Old Stone church and speeches by internationally-known leaders.

Speakers of this conference are the council's department of international justice and goodwill. The arrangements committee of the conference was headed by Dr. Chauncey H. Tobias, New York director, Phelps-Stokes fund. Dr. Walter W. Van Kirk is executive secretary, and the Rev. Richard M. Fagley, co-secretary of the department.

Speakers at the conference include the Rt. Rev. William Scarella, St. Louis, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Missouri and chairman of the department and John Foster Dulles, New York, Presbyterian layman, and noted authority on foreign affairs.

This meeting is the third international affairs conference held by Protestant churches. A special announcement of policy on international affairs will come as a result of this meeting.

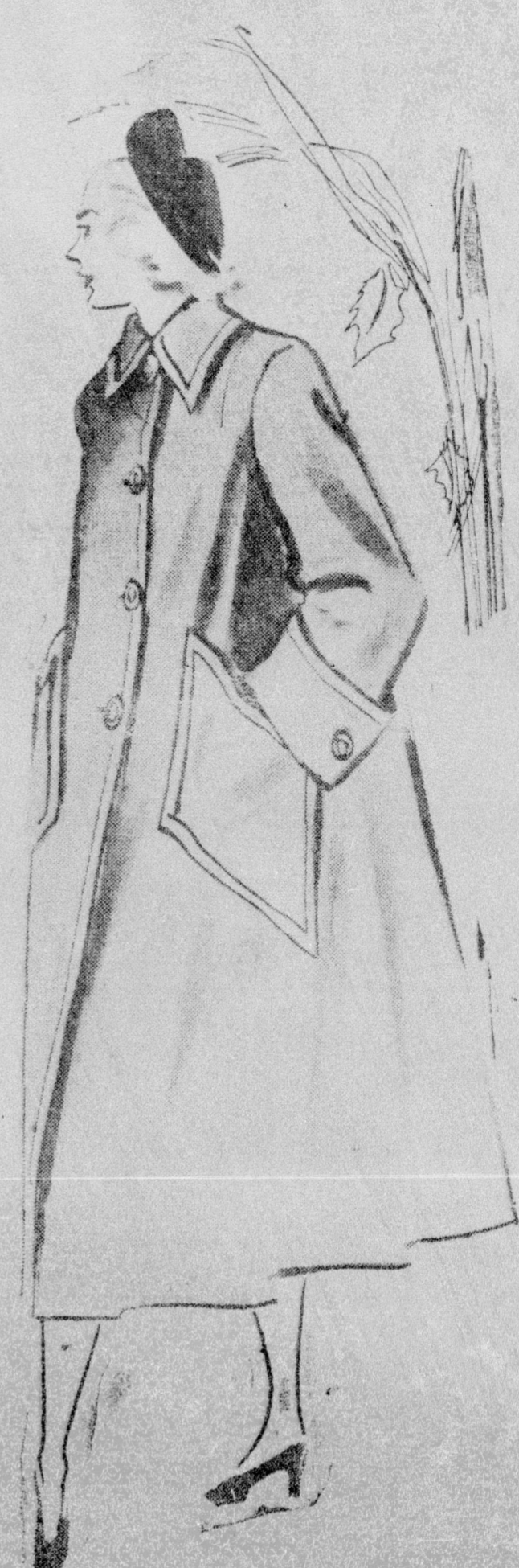
