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YOUR NATIONAL GUARD DIVISIONS CONTINUE THE OLD TRADITIONS

This is the twenty-second of a series on the Infantry and Armored Divisions of the new National Guard. They are presented to acquaint you with the organization which will be an M-Day Force, trained, equipped and available for immediate service with the Regular Army in the event of any emergency.

46TH INFANTRY DIVISION—A new outfit in the new National Guard is the 46th Infantry Division of Michigan. Its Commanding General is Major General Ralph A. Loveland, of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Although created since World War II, the 46th has old units blended in with the new. Some fought with the 32nd "Red Arrow" Division in World War I. One company traces its ancestry to 1839, when it was organized as the "Detroit City Guards" for the Black Hawk War.



Flint, Grand Rapids and Detroit now are headquarters for the division's three infantry regiments. The 125th at Flint is scattered through 13 cities. A like number of towns are inhabited by companies of the 126th headquartered at Grand Rapids. The entire 425th is located in Detroit.

The 125th, fighting alongside units from Wisconsin, gave the Japanese a bug, sustained blow in World War II. Its 2nd Battalion, in one of the great feats of the war, crossed the lofty Owen Stanley mountains on foot by a rugged trail rising over 8,000 feet. It reached Buna in November, 1942, to join other units, and tough but successful fighting won Buna-Sanannand.

Too, the 126th is a real "home-town outfit" to Grand Rapids. It was first organized there in 1874 from units like the "Grand Rapids Guards" that were even older. It won four battle streamers in World War I.

Detroit's 425th, designated the 125th for decades, is the former "Detroit City Guard." It has 11 streamers from the Civil War, all bearing famous battle-names like Bull Run, Spotsylvania and Appomattox. It was at Santiago in the fight with Spain, and in the Meuse-Argonne and three other campaigns in the first World War.

EDENTON MAN IS HELD IN MURDER

EDENTON, March 27—Henry W. Ewing, 24-year-old man of Edenton, is being held in Chowan County jail charged with the murder of his 26-year-old common-law wife, Dorothy L. Hodges.

According to Sheriff J. A. Bunch, the shooting took place Saturday morning around 10 o'clock at their home on Pembroke Creek, where they had been living as common-law husband and wife for 12 months.

The woman was shot in the chest with a .22 rifle, police reported. The cause of the shooting has not been revealed.

INQUEST HELD IN SHOT GUN DEATH

WHITEVILLE, March 27—An inquest is being conducted here, by Coroner Hugh Nance, in connection with the "movie scene" homicide of James Baldwin, 18-year old Negro of Welch Creek Township last Monday night.

The "movie scene" was given on the incident when Eugene Matthews, 22, admitted that he and Baldwin had been talking about a Western motion picture just before the fatal shooting.

Matthews who gave himself up to the Sheriff's department, told officers that he was holding the shotgun in one hand and was preparing to take it into the Baldwin home when the gun was discharged. Baldwin was struck in the stomach.

Just before Baldwin died in Columbus County Hospital, Matthews visited him.

Hawaiian Hopes Are Seen In Jeopardy

HONOLULU (AP)—Hawaiians hope for statehood being granted during the 81st Congressional session is now dusky. Many island leaders believe the present Republican-Dixie Democratic coalition poses a menacing knife for statehood should it continue to stay.

It was impossible, delegate Joseph R. Fillingim, of Hawaii, who let the people of these beautiful islands know which way the wind was blowing. When he flew here to address the Legislature, a few weeks ago on the progress of statehood legislation in congress, he said:

"We are a part of the great civil rights program which adoption has been strongly recommended by the President. I agree that civil rights is involved in all parts of this program. However, I do not believe that statehood for Hawaii is a race question, and certainly it has no relationship to the problem which prompted proposals for anti-lynching and anti-poll tax legislation which are part of this program."

When Sen. Hugh Butler and his family were here last year inviting the readiness of Hawaii for admission as a state, the senator stated he did not see where Hawaii was ready. He has introduced a bill to allow the people of Hawaii to elect their own governor which the President at present opposes. But he sees too much opposition to any statehood at this time.

Charles W. Wilfred, C. T. Tinsford, chairman, was appointed president of the Hawaiian legislature, appropriate for a republic. They say supporters will take no loss at Hawaiian politics and decide that there is not enough white supremacy in Hawaii. Himom Fong, Chinese, is speaker of the house.

ARMY'S PROGRESS WILL BE SHOWN IN GRAPHIC ART

An interesting feature of the Army Day observance, April 6, will be an exhibition of reproductions of paintings, photographs and prints depicting the history of the United States Army from its inception.

The exhibit will consist of 240 historical pictures tracing the history of the Army from the Revolutionary War to the present. This is done through reproductions of old paintings, engravings, prints, documents and photographs. The exhibit will include Paul Revere's engraving of the "Boston Massacre", Trumbull's painting of the "Surrender of Burgoyne", Currier and Ives prints, Remington's drawings of the pioneer west, a number of Brady's Civil War photographs, combat photographs of World Wars One and Two, facsimile of Washington's Oath of Allegiance and other items giving a pictorial presentation of the Army from its beginning up to the present day. The exhibit will be circulated throughout the major cities of the United States.

CHASED BY MOB, MAN BREAKS LEG

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—A case of mistaken identity put 32-year-old Edward Turner in General hospital with a broken leg here last week. Turner sustained the injury when he ran into a police car while fleeing a group of white youths who mistook him for a man who had grabbed a white girl earlier in the day. He was running so fast and looking over his shoulder at the pursuers that he did not see the parked squad car.

The incident had its beginning, according to police, when Miss Martha Martin, 15, told her brother and some other boys that a Negro man grabbed her throat, but ran when she screamed. The boys began a search for the molester, armed with clubs and stones. About 9:30 that night, they saw Turner walking down the street. When the intended victim saw them approaching waving clubs and throwing stones, he began to run.

Patrolman Harry P. Popham, cruising by in the patrol car, stopped to investigate. Before he could warn Turner, the fleeing man ran into the front of the car. The police had a hard time keeping the young mob from beating the man with clubs before he could be put in the car. Later it was learned Turner was not the man involved.
