### PLAN GRADUATION ACTIVITIES

Following May comes June and graduation. And that is the topic being discussed by the planning committee of the Midway Television Institute in Chicago. This committee is com-

A full program of activities for the summer months has been arranged at Shaw University. The first summer session will begin June 6 and will extend over a six weeks period ending July 11. The second session will run from July 12, to August 16. A special unit for college credit will be a Workshop Seminar for school principals and supervisors. A course in typing also is to be offered during the summer.

The annual Ministers Institute will be held for one week Monday through Friday, June 13-17, under the joint sponsorship of the University and the General Baptist Convention.

Running concurrently with the institute will be a Leadership Training Conference annually held in cooperation with the Woman Home and Foreign Missionary Convention of North Carolina.

Three musical programs, in the interest of the United Negro College Fund Drive, were given in the Eastern North Carolina District recently. All three of the churches, located at Murfreesboro, Reidsville and Windsor, had a large and appreciative audience to witness the programs which included a brief history of the United Negro College Fund by Melvin Johnson, Hampton Institute graduate.

Other features on the programs were as follows: Solos by Miss Milford Simmons, Mrs. Ruby J. Manner, Elizabeth City State Teachers College; Miss Dorothy Stephen, Hampton Institute; Mrs. Fannie Kee Magget, Hampton Institute; Mrs. Margaret H. Shepard, Shaw University; Mrs. E. Y. Morris, Hampton Institute; Miss Vivian White, Fisk University and Quarter selections by the Newsome Brothers of Hampton Institute and St. Paul.

Final remarks on the programs were made by Mrs. Fannie T. Newsome, who is chairman of the Alumni Council of private colleges of Eastern North Carolina District. Mrs. Clara York served as chairman of program committee, and E. W. Goddard served as Publicity chairman. On each program a local minister had charge of free offering. As a result \$125.00 was realized for the United Negro College Fund. This amount was turned over the Raleigh Inter-Alumni Council, affiliated with the United Negro College Fund.
