In addition to the formal exercises, a full schedule of social activities has been planned for alumni and friends.

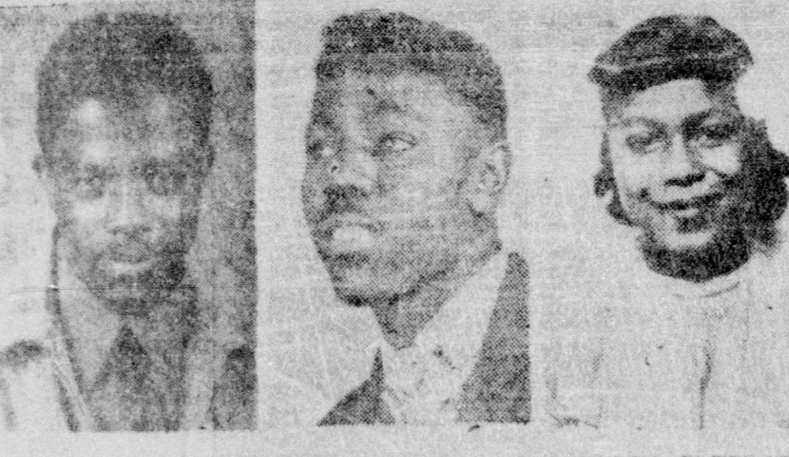

## SEVEN STUDENTS WIN WSTC SCHOLARSHIPS

**WINSTON-SALEM** — Seven \$75 scholarships amounting to \$525 each have been awarded to high school seniors by the Alumni Association of the Winston-Salem Teachers College. The winners will be announced at their various commencement and at the college commencement exercises.

The winners are Miss Ernestine Ward of Goldsboro, N. C.; Grace Olive Smith of Rocky Mount, N. C.; Roberta Peterson of Roseboro, N. C.; Barbara Mauk of Cleveland, N. C.; and Vernon Benza of the Capital Highway High School at Hamlet, N. C.

All of these students have already made application for admission to the Winston-Salem Teachers College for the Fall term and will be freshmen during the 1949-50 session.

These seven students were selected from 24 applicants for \$225 to be allotted in scholarships of \$75 each from the alumni association.

Miss Ward is graduating from the Dilford High School of Goldsboro where she is an office assistant, a member of the glee club, a cheer leader and a member of the newspaper staff.

Miss Mauk will be a graduate of the R. A. Claymont High School in Cleveland, N. C. where she is a member of the glee club, the girls basketball team, editor of the school paper, president of the student council and senior class.

Miss Ledbetter is graduating from the New Hope High School in Rutherfordton, N. C. where she is a member of the student council, safety patrol and choral club.

## Shaw's Summer Activities Set

A full program of activities for the summer months has been arranged at Shaw University. The first summer session will begin June 6 and will extend over a six weeks period ending July 11. The second session will run from July 12 to August 16. A special unit for college credit will be a Workshop-Seminar for school principals and supervisors. A course in typing also is to be offered during the summer.

The annual Ministers Institute will be held for one week, Monday through Friday, June 13-17, under the joint sponsorship of the University and the General Baptist Convention. Running concurrently with the institute will be a Leadership Training Conference annually held in cooperation with the Woman Home and Foreign Missionary Convention of North Carolina. The program of the two meetings will provide courses of study, discussions, and special lecture on problems which concern pastors and women leaders.

Study units have been planned for ministers during the institute. Courses will be taught by Dr. C. L. Franklin, Pastor of the Mount Lebanon Baptist Church, Brooklyn, New York, and by Dr. George W. Harvey, Editor-in-Chief of the Sunday School Publishing Board of the National Baptist Convention, Inc.

Instructors for the Leadership Conference will be Mrs. Rebecca J. Galloway, of the Department of Religious Education, Virginia Union University; Mrs. Robert P. Daniel; and Miss Ann W. Ferebee, Instructor of Religious Education at Shaw University. Rabbi Harry Caplan will give a series of three lectures on Judaism. Sermons during the conference will be preached by the Rev. J. W. Croom of Statesville, and the Rev. H. L. Mitchell of Gatesville.

The all-conference reception will be held Thursday night June 17, at which time President and Mrs. Daniel will be at home to members of both the ministers and missionary groups.

A six weeks study session for ministers and missionaries will get under way following the annual institute. Courses in English, the Bible, and in Christian and Missionary Education will be provided for ministers and workers who wish to earn academic credit. The session will begin June 20, and will be conducted through July 29.

Other features on the program were as follows: Solos by Miss Mildred Simons, Mrs. Ruby J. Manley, Elizabeth City State Teachers College; Miss Dorothy Stephen, Hampton Institute; Mrs. Fannie Kee Maggett, Hampton Institute; Mrs. Margaret H. Shepard, Shaw University; Mrs. E. Y. Morris, Hampton Institute; Miss Vivian White, Fisk University; and Quartet selections by the Newsome Brothers of Hampton Institute and St. Paul.

Final remarks on the program were made by Mrs. Fannie T. Newsome, who is chairman of the Alumni Council of private colleges of Eastern North Carolina District. Mr. Clara York served as chairman of program committee, and E. W. Goddard served as Publicity chairman. On each program a local minister had charge of free offering. As a result \$125.00 was realized for the United Negro College Fund. This amount was turned over the Raleigh Inter-Alumni Council, affiliated with the United Negro College Fund.

Farmer's are expected to receive about two billion dollars from marketings in May, 5 per cent more than in April and slightly less than in May of last year. Prices received by farmers will probably average a little lower than in April for both livestock and crops — and substantially below those of last May.

An average yield of 250 bushels per acre is estimated for the 1949 spring beet crop in North Carolina.

"G38," a young turkey hen at the State College Experimental Turkey Farm, set a new record in number of eggs produced during the hatching season just completed. The hen laid 71 eggs, all of which were fertile and from which 37 healthy poulets were obtained. At 75 cents each the value of the poulets would amount to \$50.25.

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
